DEAR SIR (OR MADAM),

Herewith I have the pleasure of sending you a preliminary programme of the 24th Annual Convention, to be held from the 5th to the 10th of July next.

CANTERBURY, the Capital of Kent, and a County in itself, must be regarded as a very important City, whether it is looked at as the Seat of the Primacy of All England, a Garrison Town, an important Military Centre, or merely as a beautiful and attractive spot, surrounded by some of the finest scenery in what has been called "The Garden of England."

Irrespective of the fame of its magnificent Cathedral, in and around Canterbury will be found enough interesting Churches, Old Buildings, Ruins, Picturesque Cottages, Country Views, &c., to satisfy the most enthusiastic photographer, and should he desire to add Seascapes to his collection, he will, when at Canterbury, be only 6 miles from Whitstable, 8 from Herne Bay, 15 from Margate and Folkestone, 16 from Dover and Ramsgate, and 17 from Deal.

Canterbury is only 55 miles by road, and 61 by rail, from London. There is a good service of trains, the average time occupied by the journey being under 2 hours. Through trains are now run daily from the principal stations of nearly all the great Railway Companies, and in many instances through carriages are obtainable to within a few miles of Canterbury.

It will interest those members who were with us in Brussels has you, to know that several of our Continental friends (including Sir) Croup HERTSLET, Commandant Van Bever and M. Vanderkindere) have already eignified their intention of coming over for the Canterbury Meeting.

Hoping to receive an early intimation of your intention to be present, and also that you have been able to induce some of your photographic friends to become members of the Convention,
